

Marco with his parents, Pedro and Antonella



Remembrance of Dr. Chris Low

As a friend who served on two committees with Christopher Low, Ph.D., most recently the Finance & Budget Committee, I would like to say a few words in remembrance of Dr. Christopher Low on his untimely demise.

Dr. Christopher Low (known as Chris) with his wife, Trish, had made his home at Montebello for more than twenty-five years. During this time Chris was significantly involved in the Montebello governance as a member of the former Operations Committee 1995-1997, and Chair of that Committee 1997-2000. Then with a vision to help make Montebello the beautiful community it is today, Chris was elected to the Board of Directors for four consecutive three-year terms, 12 years, and served as Secretary for six of those vears and Vice President for the final two years.

Although the offices of Secretary and Vice President were time demanding administratively, he tirelessly and timely attended 10 to 12 scheduled monthly board meetings, frequent Executive meetings and 10 to 12 committee meetings as the Liaison Director. During these meetings his comments were always insightful and thoughtful to provoke debate, often resulting in Directors and Committee members' needing to re-examine their position on the topic being discussed.

Then, after a brief hiatus, Chris still wanted to be involved in the governance of Montebello and became a member of the Finance and Budget, and the Neighborhood Improvement Committees and was the Chair of the often demanding and stressful Covenants Committee before his demise. While it is difficult to determine the exact number of years Chris was committed and dedicated in his effort to make Montebello as we know it today, I estimate it to be nearly twenty years of the twenty-five years he made his home at Montebello.

Dr. Low was a quiet, respectful, reflective, encouraging, cool, collected persona and always approached a challenge with the thought how he could obtain a positive solution of the challenge for all persons concerned. He always gave of his time and intellect endlessly to the community we know today. I believe the past and present members of the Finance & Budget Committee and Directors of the past and present Boards of Directors hold Chris in high esteem.

In all these years, I do not recall Chris to raise his voice or be in a bad mood. He has been an exceptional person to be around and a servant to our community.

Being the person Christopher Low was, he contributed generously and exceptionally to the governance and professional culture at Montebello, to make it the envy of other condominiums in the area. Chris, you will be missed by the many friends you have made and at the Board and Committee meetings you attended the past twenty-five years

Finally, after all these words, Chris, it comes down to just seven words: "Thank You. God Bless. Rest in Peace."




