

Silent nights, boring nights

Genuine interest flavored with a hint of apathy reigned at two recent public gatherings held to solicit residents' questions about two important issues: the redesign of the community center and board elections. Both events discouraged direct audience participation by requiring that questions and comments be submitted in writing. However, the organizers' fears of uncivil outbursts were not warranted and everyone was on his or her best behavior, appropriately attired, speaking in an indoor voice, and treating fellow Montebelloans with friendship and civility.

Our leadership often wonders why more people don't participate in governance or join committees. Maybe one solution would be to treat residents as mature, intelligent adults who have something to contribute who may be trusted to express their views politely in public. Assuming that every open forum carries the risk that people will start attacking the board or management shows how little we are trusted to behave as mature, intelligent adults. Is it surprising that many residents – accomplished individuals who have managed companies and agencies, held high professional positions – don't want the humiliation of scribbling and passing a note on a little card? So when they say that board and management don't listen to the residents, it is literally true because the residents are not allowed to speak in public meetings.

Both nights should have been important to the future of our community: the hub of our administrative and social life and our elected officials. All the familiar faces who come to Cup of Joe and other events were in attendance. No one under the age of 50 was visible. Not much happened and everyone went home content, knowing that the status quo would be comfortably, quietly maintained.

While all four gentlemen running for the board are worthy, qualified candidates, it would be more fitting to call this election a nomination or appointment, because like in certain undemocratic societies, Montebello voters are *approving*, rather than *choosing*, their powerful governing board. But how can more people be encouraged to run when board meeting attendance is the same two dozen regulars in their favorite seats and perceptions of how the board's longtime members make decisions are tinged with mistrust, apathy, and resignation?

The yellow ballot form has spaces for write-in candidates. There is still time to throw your hat in the ring with an independent campaign. Please consider giving Montebello different voices and real choices and run for the Board of Directors.

SloMo 2.0

When the Montebello Community Center Master Plan (CCMP) 1.0 was created, my younger son was in elementary school. Whenever CCMP 2.0 is eventually approved and construction begins, he will be in college. "I won't live long enough to see any of this," an elderly gentleman next to me whispered.

A high turnout of residents attended the CCMP update presentation at the April 19 town hall meeting. True to tradition of avoiding potential negative comments, people had to submit their questions in writing.

Board member and co-chair of the Ad Hoc Committee for Community Master Plan Update, Guido Zanni, read the information on a projected PowerPoint presentation. Copies of the PowerPoint and CCMP summary were available as hard copies. Attendees followed along with the presentation and submitted only a handful of questions.

A few proposed ideas were rejected by the residents in 30-second surveys: day spa, business center, relocating offices to lower level, and holding all activities on the main level. Some new projects were accepted: center-wide WiFi, coffee bar (only when the café is closed), children's play area (with wholesome activities such as riding tricycles, hop-scotch, or table games), and electric car charging stations. The winners take it all

Four candidates for four open Board of Directors positions are on the ballot for the upcoming election. Three candidates are incumbents. All of them are presumed to get elected with results announced at the May 10 annual meeting.

Last Sunday night, incumbents Lynn Tjeerdsma and Raymond Goodrich, along with newcomer Jon Kandel, participated in the hour-long Meet the Candidates forum. Another incumbent, Bruce Shaw, was called away on family business. Elections Committee Vice-Chair, Joel Miller, once again emceed the night with light-hearted humor.

The community center lounge was nearly filled with more than 50 residents who wanted to hear the candidates' views on improving committee participation, recent staff firings, upgrading accessibility, promoting Montebello, and rental units. As in the past, to avoid potential negative comments or personal attacks, all questions had to be submitted in writing and then read by Miller. No resident used his or her voice to directly address the candidates or the audience.

Raymond Goodrich, who was appointed to the board last year after Jerry Stedge's sudden resignation, told the audience he was a non-resident owner who bought the first of his four units in 1991. A banker, he wore an open-collar

information was presented about any of these projects.

Other proposals include adding a break room with running water and a refrigerator for association staff, installing a "modest" AV system and a unisex bathroom on the lower level, fully renovating the bowling alley, and adding a mani-pedi station at the hair salon.

The café would undergo extensive renovation by extending into a portion of what is currently the store and remodeling the outdated kitchen.

A multipurpose room, whose location was not specified ("on the ceiling," quipped a woman next to me) would have space for 20 people and be equipped with telephone conferencing, data, and AV.

The main lounge may or may not lose the raised platforms and could possibly gain a raised platform (not a stage) for presentations and performances. In addition, the room would be sliced into smaller units with movable partitions to create smaller spaces for multiple (quiet) functions. Somewhere in this space could be a small kitchenette and storage credenzas. The AV system will be upgraded and a larger TV will be installed.

The proposed changes would eliminate the current gazebo on the smaller picnic hill; the main Picnic Hill will have improved accessibility and a pavilion, gas grills, and a gas fire-pit conversation area.

The open space in front of the locker rooms would be enlarged when the storage closet that doubles as office space is opened up to create a game room with more game tables.

No costs or dates were mentioned. The next step is to give the revised wish list to Kerns Group Architects, who have worked on Montebello's other design projects. In a few months, Kerns will come up with a design proposal, estimated costs, and construction documents. After more surveys, focus groups, and silent town hall meetings, the board will accept all or some of the proposals. This will be followed by obtaining construction documents, bids, and zoning permits. In the bestcase scenario, construction will begin in 2020 ... blue-and-white checkered shirt and dark separates. In his opening remarks, Goodrich reiterated his platform from his campaign statement – increasing owners' equity, keeping the board focused on strategy, and attracting and retaining excellent staff. Although unfamiliar to many recent residents, Goodrich is well-versed in Montebello's governance with years-ago stints as board president, board treasurer, and Finance and Budget Committee chair.

A retired executive from a printing/ mailing company and a professional photographer, Jon Kandel and his wife moved to the 16th floor of Building 3 from Manhattan last November. Dressed in a navy blue suit, he spoke of his accomplishments as president of the 1270 Fifth Avenue Cooperative, a 201-unit building at the top of Central Park, where he led the co-op through a series of major capital improvements.

Wearing shiny black cowboy boots and a jeweled-tone paisley tie, second-term candidate Lynn Tjeersdma, who also resides on the 16th floor of Building 3, said he would continue to represent Montebello residents in a fair, equitable, and sensible manner. Tjeerdsma is a senior policy advisor to Sen. John Thune of South Dakota.

The first question came from Bonnie Jacob, who asked the candidates how they would develop new leadership by encouraging more women and other under-represented groups to run for the board or join committees.

"The answer is you," Kandel motioned at the audience. Step up and get more engaged and interested, he said, because there is no magic solution.

Tjeerdsma acknowledged that in a community of 2,000, people come to Montebello for different reasons. Living in a high-stress D.C. area with demanding jobs, many want to come home and not think about committees or more meetings. "We need to respect those who just want to live here without getting involved." For him, serving on the board in addition to his full-time job on the Hill has been a very rewarding experience.

At the beginning of the meeting, Miller read a statement from management that Montebello's employment policy was followed in accordance with Virginia and federal labor laws and with full knowledge and concurrence of the board when two long-time employees were recently dismissed. There were no specifics regarding the reasons for termination. Two questions regarding the firings received vague answers from the candidates. "How will you reassure Montebello employees that it's a good place to work?" asked Noel Sipple.

The association needs to be sure it has a good general manager whose decisions the board needs to support, Tjeersma said. Goodrich added it was important for management to have proper resources for the training of its staff. "Firing occurs everywhere," Kandel said. He does not believe the board should get involved between management and employees.

Three questions addressed Goodrich's non-resident status. "Why do you want to serve on the board if you live in Vienna?" asked Karen Barnes. Goodrich's biographical information lists his mailing address as a P.O. Box in McLean; he declined to share his home address. "As an absentee landlord who has not lived at Montebello in about a decade, do you feel you truly understand the essence and needs of our community if you don't walk the grounds, attend events, and socialize with your neighbors?" was the last part of this writer's submitted written question that was not asked aloud.

"Why do people want to serve?" Goodrich shot back. As an experienced banker with decades of expertise in finances and human resources, he said he had a lot to contribute to Montebello. Owning four units "shows my commitment to Montebello," he said. Serving on the Promoting Montebello Committee and developing a comprehensive marketing campaign was the result of his interest to promote Montebello to potential investors, not because he wants to make a profit from selling his units, he said.

Both Tjeersdma and Kandel said they did not see Goodrich's non-resident status as a negative or conflict of interest, but appreciate the considerable skills he brings to the table. "There is no difference between living here and not living here," Kandel said. In fact, not living here makes it more difficult for Goodrich to devote energy to take on projects. "If our apartment values go up, it's a good thing."

Carole Appel asked about making every building lobby accessible with ramps to accommodate those who cannot walk up the stairs and are forced to use the B-3 entrance.

Tjeersdma agreed that lobby accessibility has been brought up numerous times and it's been deemed "very cost-prohibitive." Kandel said that besides the cost issue, the ramp is also a technical issue that may not be feasible for our lobbies.

After enjoying some post-meeting Costco chocolate chip cookies and soft drinks, people dispersed to their homes to mull over what they heard from three dapper, well-spoken gentlemen who will join in governing Montebello in the coming years.

According to our bylaws, at least 25 percent of unit owners (approximately 250 units) need to vote in order to have a quorum. People with smaller units have a smaller share of the vote; people with larger units have a larger share (it's the number at the bottom of your ballot); people with multiple units have more votes. Everyone went home a winner. – *Mikhailina Karina*

We, as long-term residents of Montebello, would like to make the Board of Directors aware of a recent situation where we learned that George Gardner, the General Manager of the Montebello Condominium Unit Owners Association (MCUOA), abruptly fired two long-term loyal employees. The first employee was Mr Jenkins, one of our guards who has been employed here for 13 years and has served honorably. Then, approximately 10 days later, Mr Gardner with no notice, fired another employee, Mr T, who oversaw and skillfully managed Community Center activities for 24 years.

We are concerned about Mr Gardner's alarming trend. Under the two previous general managers, there have been no such abrupt firings of loyal, dedicated, long-term employees. As the result of these sudden firings, there has been many conversations amongst residents and staff concerning who might be next.

As such we request the following:

- A policy be implemented requiring employment terminations to be approved by the Board.
- A policy be implemented whereby MCUOA staff who have differing opinions regarding the efficient and effective operation of the MCUOA can be brought to the Board without fear of retaliation.
- A policy be implemented where by employee actions can be appealed to the Board before becoming effective.
- The Board discusses with Mr Gardner the recent, short notice firings of long term MCUOA staff who apparently performed satisfactorily under previous managers.

Montebello's policy regarding employment is to act in accordance with Federal and Virginia Labor Law and in accordance with the Virginia Condominium Act.

The recent personnel actions were taken in accordance with the above policy after careful consideration of all the factors involved in each situation and were done with the full knowledge and concurrence of the Board."
