



## Will Jarred directs The Savannah Disputation


Montebello's very own Will Jarred will be directing his first play at The Little Theatre of Alexandria. The play, The Savannah Disputation, runs from April 27 to May 18. It is about two older sisters, devout Catholics, who are approached by a Christian fundamentalist hoping to convert and save them from hell and damnation. While the subject matter and themes of lost love and being single and elderly and the loneliness that can ensue, sound serious, the play is actually heartwarming and humorous. There is an authenticity to the women that helps the audience connect with their characters. The religious undertones and how people interpret the Bible to promote their own agendas also plays prominently.

Will was a theater major in college. He married young and had two children, so he had to put his dream of acting on the back burner while he worked for a book publisher. He continued to do community theater when he could on the side. In 2001, he was in his last show as an actor. Fast forward 13 years when Will moved to Montebello. Like many of us, he was downsizing and was looking for a no-hassle lifestyle. He used an online real estate tool where his search for "tennis courts" brought him to Montebello. "Montebello felt affordable and it felt like a community," he said. Besides tennis, Will is passionate about film and film history, travel and architecture. He helps lead discussions for the AiM film group that meets once a month in a party room, and has recently started Hatha Yoga offered at Montebello with Virginia Nickich on Wednesday evenings.

When Will moved to Montebello, he resurrected his love of theater and started looking for opportunities on actor boards. He saw a notice on Facebook

that The Little Theatre of Alexandria was looking for directors for the 2018 season. He applied and went through a professional and rigorous interview process before being offered a director position. The Savannah Disputation is his directorial debut for LTA.

The play is in formation. Casting calls and auditions happened at the beginning of March. The first readthrough was March 8 and official rehearsals began March 12. For the director, the job becomes demanding once casting is complete. Will says, "We're working five nights a week, from 7 to 10 p.m. for four weeks, and add weekend tech rehearsals and run-throughs for the remaining two weeks."

All of this is in addition to Will's full-time day job as national director of marketing and communications for NAMI, the National Alliance on Mental Illness, where he manages a staff of 10. "This is my life right now, there is no time for anything else."

As director, Will has the full support of producers, set designers and stage managers, which gives him the luxury of focusing on the actors and acting. He is responsible for conceiving a vision of the play and approves all aspects of the production. When asked why LTA is unique, Will responded, "Because it is a volunteer-run organization with the highest level of professional quality. It also has a strong educational component so it's also about giving back to the community." He went on to say, "Talent is mostly local, so you may see someone you know on stage. The quality of the show versus the price of a ticket is phenomenal."

Will he ever act again? "I definitely miss being on stage, but it has to be the right role. I am very picky about that now. There needs to be a strong production team as well."

Right now, Will is very happy to be involved in the local community in Alexandria with both theater and Montebello. He is also proud to be a part of a show that offers parts to older women, roles that are hard to come by.

## **Weed Wranglers battle invaders from Mount Eagle Park**

For the last two years, dozens of participants in Weed Wrangle® Montebello have been working to improve the health of our woodlands by removing invasive plants that don't belong here. One of the chief targets has been English ivy, planted as an ornamental here long ago, before its dangers to native plant life were recognized.

Now that professionals have treated most of the English ivy in the Montebello woods, the Weed Wrangle® Montebello project has set its sights on the most threatening source of English ivy seeds that could reinfect our grounds the parkland just on the outside of our fence.

While Mount Eagle Park was, up until the late 1960s, part of the same historic Mount Eagle property as Montebello, the park is now under the jurisdiction of Fairfax County. Of course, much of the park is open and grassy, but large areas along the edges have trees that have become overgrown

with English ivy. And it is primarily up in the trees where English ivy produces flowers and fruits. Birds eat the ivy fruits and spread the seeds in their droppings.

On Saturday, April 13, at 9 a.m., Weed Wranglers from Montebello will partner with other volunteers from the Fairfax County Invasive Management Area program to battle the ivy. Our focus will primarily be on the trees just outside Montebello's fence, on either side of the back gate that leads toward the Metro. Top priority is to sever the roots of English ivy growing up the trees.

Our leader will be Catherine Ledec.

# Fios work to begin on Monday, board member resigns, additional parking decal debated

Following last week's resignation of Lynn Tjeerdsma from the Board of Directors, a call for a replacement will go out in the coming days. A new director will be chosen in May.

A smaller board conducted business on Tuesday night. Heather Click was absent and Raymond Goodrich participated via telephone.

New board president Jon Kandel announced that long-awaited Verizon Fios service will begin the installation process next Monday. Starting in Building 3, residents will have three technical visits: electrical (replacing the twist lock receptacle in HVAC closets with a standard 3-prong receptacle), drilling the concrete slab in HVAC closets, and installing fiber cable. He said the work is expected to be completed in the next two to two-and-a-half months.

The board spent nearly 15 minutes discussing a request for an exception to the parking decal rule, which allows two decals per unit. The issue involves a resident who bought a third car not realizing the bylaws limitation. (See letter, redacted by resident's request)

After raising the possibilities of parking the extra car in a remote location by the back gate or approving the decal on an annual basis, the board agreed to move the discussion to next week's meeting. Some people were concerned about setting a precedent to requests for additional vehicles.

The board's annual retreat will take place on April 27 in party room 3 from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. No agenda items were announced.

Quality Improvement Committee chairman Guido Zanni asked the board to expand QI membership from three directors to additional resident consultants to assist with upcoming projects.

If I had realized there was a limit of two parking stickers per unit, I would have done this differently. I was genuinely surprised to hear of this limitation. I have bought the car and paid for it. Selling it now would result in a substantial loss. Storing it offsite would make it difficult to use. Please give me a couple of years to enjoy it, while I decide if I want to keep it, or the sensible

- Approximately 48 million Americans have a significant hearing loss.
- People with hearing loss wait an average of 7 years before seeking
- Of Americans in the workplace, 22 million or about 22 percent—are exposed to hazardous noise levels at work.
- 12.5 percent of kids between the ages of 6 and 19 have hearing loss as a result of listening to loud music, particularly through earbuds at unsafe volumes.






