

Dance like John Travolta with free disco lessons

Disco is stayin' alive at Montebello with upcoming free disco dance lessons and parties. The first lesson will take place this Sunday, September 15 from 1 to 2 p.m. in the Community Center lounge. The next disco party will be on October 27.

Lessons will initially focus on the dances performed by John Travolta in his classic movie Saturday Night Fever, Brooklyn Shuffle line dance. Eventually, depending on how quickly class participants progress, we could also teach the Latin Hustle and the Sling Hustle, with the possibility of branching out in the future to salsa and bachata.


An attendant objective will be to bring Montebello residents the many extraordinary benefits which medical experts tell us dancing brings: happiness, health, and community connectedness.

Directors Kandel and Zanni explain CC renovation finances

For nearly 30 minutes, board president Jon Kandel and director Guido Zanni disputed financial analysis in the August 15 *Voice* article, "Major concerns with Reserve Balance require cuts to the CC renovation proposal," by Brian Goldberg. (http://montebellovoice. com/TheMontebelloVoice_19_08_15. pdf) Kandel said the *Voice* article and subsequent emails were erroneous and misleading.

Kandel and Zanni, both former board treasurers, offered detailed explanations of the Reserve Budget, how the CC renovation is funded, Virginia condo laws, stellar annual audits, cash flow analysis, and condo fee increases. No other board members or attendees engaged in the discussion.

About 20 people, mostly committee chairs and meeting regulars, attended the September 10 session. Director Monica Sangbong was absent and Raymond Goodrich was on the phone.

Without stating a dollar amount, Kandel said the total cost of the renovation will go up due to two additions: relocation of the air system and a new walk-in cooler. He expects the demolition to begin in April at the earliest and for the project to be completed in six and a half months.
