### Time for a colorful **Fiesta**!

hen I was in high school in Morgantown, West Virginia, it seemed that all my friends and family had colorful Fiestaware in their homes.

The vibrant American-made Fiesta pottery has brightened tables since the 1930s. Designed by Frederick Hurten Rhead for the Homer Laughlin China Company in Newell, West Virginia, the original colors were red, yellow, cobalt blue, green, and ivory. Turquoise was introduced about a year later. The genius of the line was how the colors could be





Active shooter incidents are often unpredictable and can evolve quickly. In the midst of the chaos, anyone can play an integral role in mitigating the impacts of an active shooter incident.

In many cases, there is no pattern or method to the selection of victims by an active shooter, and these situations are, by their very nature, seemingly random and erratic. This guide and related information supplied by Department of Homeland Security (DHS) is provided here to raise awareness among Montebello residents on how to respond to such a situation wherever and whenever it may occur.

RUN	HIDE	FIGHT
<ul> <li>If you can safely get to an exit:</li> <li>Move rapidly and exit the building</li> <li>Take your mobile phone if handy: leave your other belongings.</li> <li>Direct others to exit as you go.</li> <li>Once outside and in a safe location call 911 and be prepared to provide as much detail as possible</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>If you can't safely exit:</li> <li>Move quickly to a location away from the shooter's view that provides some protection if possible</li> <li>Lock the doors and block the entrances using whatever is possible</li> <li>Silence your phone and turn off the lights</li> <li>Do not huddle with multiple people - spread out</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>As a last resort and only when your life is in imminent danger: <ul> <li>Create a plan; work with others who are nearby</li> <li>Attempt to incapacitate the shooter using any means available</li> <li>Act with physical aggression and determination</li> </ul> </li> </ul>

mixed and matched and Depression Era budget-minded consumers could buy single pieces at a time instead of full sets. The china was mass-produced and sold in department stores and fiveand-dimes like Woolworth's.

The line's popularity grew in part because the company continually brought out new shades to suit changing tastes – soft pastels in the '50s and brighter shades in the early '60s. After Fiesta's peak in 1948, when 10 million pieces were purchased, demand steadily declined until the line was retired in the early 1970s. In 1986, Bloomingdale's partnered with the Homer Laughlin China Company to reintroduce the colorful dish ware. The modern Fiesta is lead-free and safe to use in the dishwasher and microwave.

Although popular with collectors, Fiestaware is also cherished by families who pass it down through generations to grace holiday tables each year. No doubt, Fiesta will be appearing at thousands of Thanksgiving and Christmas meals this year!




